### Comments:

- British Columbia has fallen behind the rest of the major Canadian provinces in providing treatment to patients suffering from this debilitating disease.
- Aside from the dedicated specialists providing treatment in BC, IPF is not well understood by health care providers.
- The Minister of Health is not listening to our call for action and is not funding any treatment for IPF-leaving patients and their families to deal with this disease without financial support for treatments that could extend patients lives and well-being.
- To date, a lack of budget has been provided as the main barrier, but the provincial budget is balanced and has benefitted from surpluses.
- The Patient Charter outlines what is needed from the provincial government to ensure a standard of care is being upheld for IPF patients.
